



Saint Anne School Reopening Plan

Overview

In these difficult and uncertain times, we have constructed a plan that we believe will allow us to provide our students with the best education possible, while keeping health and safety a top priority. This plan details the policies and procedures that we have determined will enable students and staff to return to campus safely and maintain as much stability and consistency as possible in these challenging circumstances. This is a preliminary draft that is subject to change; it may be revised and finalized prior to the start of the school year. This document is meant to supplement the St. Anne School Parent Handbook. It contains updated information that applies to the current COVID situation; policies included here supersede those in our Handbook. Parents and students should still review the Handbook for any policies not included or updated here (i.e. dress code guidelines, general school information, etc.) As we move forward, we are excited to welcome our students back on campus, and we remain committed to providing them to grow in faith, knowledge, and service.

The parent survey sent out in June noted that over three-quarters of our families wanted our school to return to in-school instruction this coming year. The other 25% of our families were uncertain about their children returning to the building, wanted a hybrid version of returning to campus full-time, or did not feel comfortable having their child returning to campus and thus wanted Distance Learning to continue in the Fall. In an effort to be sensitive to the needs and concerns of all our families, we are offering two options to families with regards to their child's education. The first option for parents is

that their child(ren) will return to live in-school instruction five days a week for our normal full-day instruction. This plan details the changes that will be made in school policies and procedures for safety. The second option is offering a Distance Learning platform for those families who do not feel comfortable bringing their children back to the school building for instruction. Those students who will be utilizing a DL approach will need to adhere to the requirements of participating in DL as noted later on in this document. It is important to note, however, that DL students cannot switch back and forth from DL to in-school instruction during the course of the first semester. If there is a breakthrough with a vaccine in the coming months, the school's current instructional plans will be changed and/or amended as needed/appropriate.

Again, the teachers, staff, and I look forward to working with all of our students. The health and safety of our students and staff is a priority. Working together we will carry on our long tradition of instilling in our students a love and curiosity of learning, a respect for others, and a sense of caring for our world-wide family....ALL of which is founded on each of us living our lives based on the teachings of Jesus.

What to Expect When Schools Reopen

The San Francisco Department of Public Health recommends the following health and safety guidance for the reopening of schools based on current information. This guidance will be updated as the situation changes.

General COVID Procedures

We ask that parents discuss the following health and safety procedures with their children, and emphasize the importance of physical distancing, wearing masks, and frequent hand washing/sanitizing. Following these guidelines is essential for keeping our community safe and healthy.

- All students, faculty, and staff will be required to wear masks on campus. During instruction, teachers may also wear a clear face shield.
- Everyone on campus must refrain from shaking hands, hugging, and other close physical contact.
- Frequent hand washing and hand sanitizing procedures will be implemented in each classroom.
- Water fountains will be turned off thus not available to the students. Students should bring adequately-filled water bottles from home to last them the entire day. Students will not have an opportunity to refill water bottles at school.
- Bathroom routines will be established to ensure physical distancing and sanitizing. Additionally, bathrooms will be cleaned and sanitized throughout the day and at the end of the day.
- High-touch points in each classroom will be sanitized frequently throughout the day.
- Classroom visitors and volunteers cannot be accommodated at this time.
- Classroom desks will be arranged to promote physical distancing (6 feet apart according to the SFDPH guidelines)

- All students and staff will be encouraged to wash their hands regularly and thoroughly. Hand sanitizer will be made available in every classroom, restroom, and common space.
- Supply sharing will be limited between students and disinfected between uses if sharing is unavoidable.
- Students/Adults who are not feeling well should not go to school.

Self-Screening for Symptoms

- Before students and staff come to school, they will need to conduct a self-check for signs and symptoms of COVID-19.
- Anyone who has been exposed to someone with COVID-19 in the past 14 days (exposure means within 4-6 feet for 15-minutes or longer) or who is showing symptoms should not come to school.
- Students and staff should self-check for symptoms throughout the day. Those who develop signs and symptoms of COVID-19 will be sent home.

Long-term School Closure Plan

In the event that school is closed for an extended period of time, St. Anne School will revert to an online Distance Learning plan. A structured, full day schedule will be implemented with a combination of daily Google Classes and assignments delivered via online learning platforms. All necessary resources and information will be posted for parents for easy access.

Other Safety Considerations

- Cloth face coverings will be worn by all faculty, staff, and any adult. Teachers will have access to face shields in addition to wearing a mask if desired.
- Students are required to wear cloth face coverings. Cloth face coverings are important even when physical distancing and cohort groups are occurring.
- Physical distancing is important at all times, including during drop-off and pick-up of students.
- Students will be frequently reminded to avoid touching their face and face covering, and to wash their hands often.
- Gloves will be used by those conducting duties such as cleaning, first aid, and/or providing medical procedures.
- Physical barriers may be used when physical distancing is not possible.

Attending to the physical, mental, social, and emotional well-being of our students will be a top priority as they return to school.

On Campus and in the Classroom

Physical distancing helps limit the spread of the virus. Saint Anne School will implement the following strategies to maintain smaller groups of students in shared spaces:

- Visitors to the building will be limited to those who might be needed to ensure the health and safety of students or staff.
- Students will be kept in smaller cohorts with minimal mixing to the greatest extent practicable.
- Recess will be in grade-level cohort groups outside in their designated areas of the yard.
- Lunch will be in grade-level cohort groups outside in their designated areas of the yard.
- Student desks will be spaced six (6) feet apart to promote physical distancing where practicable.
- Hot Lunch will not be available until the school returns to a normal operating mode after the guidelines have been changed or lifted.
- St. Anne School will avoid large gatherings such as assemblies and all-school Masses.

- A sick room / isolation room has been designated for students who are not feeling well to minimize contact with others until they can go home. Parents must pick up sick children within the hour - families need to have someone reliable designated for this task if a parent is unable to pick up the child in a timely manner. In order to avoid possible exposure to staff and students, parents will wait outside the set of upper doors of the school building. Children will be walked to those entrance doors at the time parents arrive.

What is physical distancing?

Social distancing, also called "physical distancing," means keeping space between yourself and other people outside of your home. To practice physical distancing:

- Where practicable, maintain physical distancing of six feet between adults and students; four to six feet distance is permissible between students within a classroom or instructional area
- Do not gather in groups
- Stay out of crowded places and avoid mass gatherings

In addition to everyday steps to prevent COVID-19, keeping space between you and others and wearing face coverings are the best tools we have to avoid being exposed to this virus and slowing its spread locally, nationally, and globally. *See

To maintain physical distancing, activities that require students to congregate will be limited and modified as guidelines change.

Physical distancing is critical to limiting the spread of COVID-19. It will impact how some courses will be taught and which sports and extracurricular activities students will be able to participate in safely.

At this time, the following activities will not take place:

- After-school programs like Chinese School, chess, tennis, yoga, band, choir, etc.
- Altar serving
- All school Masses

- CYO Sports

At this time, the following activities may take place virtually, using online resources:

- Assemblies/Rallies
- Field trips

In-Class

- To minimize the number of students interacting, at least six feet of physical distancing between students will be maintained in all classes and courses as practicable.

Division of Classes is as follows:

- Kindergarten will be relocated to the upper and lower cafeteria. First grade will occupy the first grade classroom and the Spanish classroom. Second grade will occupy the second grade classroom and the Primary Science classroom. Third grade, being small in number, will remain in third grade. Fourth grade will occupy the fourth grade classroom and the upstairs conference room. Fifth grade will be moved to the science room as it is large enough to socially distance all the students. Sixth grade will occupy the sixth grade classroom and the fifth grade classroom. Seventh grade will occupy the seventh grade classroom and the music room. Eight-one will occupy the 7-1 classroom and the 7-2 classroom. Eight-two will occupy the 8-2 classroom and the old 8-1 classroom.
- Classroom windows will be opened as appropriate to allow for circulation/ventilation of air throughout the classroom.
- Since drinking fountains have been turned off, thus not available for use, students will be directed to bring their own filled water bottle to school each day.
- Some subjects may need modifications on how they will be taught if physical distancing is not feasible or when there is an increased risk for spreading the virus.

- We will work with students and families to ensure accommodations are made and alternative options will be considered.
- All students are required to wear face coverings.
- Due to health and safety restrictions, recess procedures will follow guidelines for physical distancing. Students will have the opportunity to eat a snack, use the restroom, socialize with their peers, and engage in physical movement during their scheduled breaks.
- If a student needs to use the restroom during class time, they will be allowed to go but will need to follow the number limitation in the bathroom at one time as well as the social distancing requirements. No more than four students may be in the bathroom at a time. When going to the bathroom, the student will take a bathroom “pass” with them to facilitate social distancing. Before a student enters the bathroom s/he will place his/her “pass” on to one of the four hooks outside the bathroom door. When there are four passes on the hooks, other students will wait outside door in distanced line till a space opens. After using the restroom, the child will wash their hands with soap and water, dry them, and then leave the bathroom taking off their “pass” from the hook outside the bathroom and then go directly back to class.

Healthy Hygiene Practices

How will healthy hygiene practices be supported at schools?

St. Anne School will teach and reinforce – to both students and staff – healthy hygiene practices: such as washing hands; avoiding contact with one's eyes, nose, and mouth; and safely covering coughs and sneezes.

Other methods to promote healthy hygiene include the following:

- Staff will model and practice hand washing.
- Routines have been developed enabling students and staff to wash/sanitize their hands at regular intervals. All will sanitize their hands when they first enter the school building in the morning. Hand sanitizer will be used after a child or adult coughs or sneezes. Before going out to recess or lunch all will sanitize their hands. Before returning to the classroom hand washing/sanitizing will take place. After the use of the restroom, all will wash their hands.
- Staff will teach and reinforce the proper use of cloth face coverings, masks, or face shields at the beginning of the day and throughout the day as appropriate. Cloth face coverings are most essential at all times and proper use of them will be reinforced by the teachers.
- Students and staff will be frequently reminded not to touch their face covering and to wash their hands frequently.

Adequate supplies will be available to support healthy hygiene behaviors, including soap (in the bathrooms), tissues, trash cans, face coverings, and

hand sanitizer in the classrooms, at all entrances, offices, and gathering areas.



Screening and Testing

Temperature screening will be implemented for all students and staff as well as any essential visitors to St. Anne School. Each of those groups of individuals will be required to present a signed form stating that the child/person has not shown any signs of COVID-19 and is in good health, wear a mask, and apply hand sanitizer at the time of entry. Forms will be cataloged and filed daily for any future need.

We ask families to take their child(ren)'s temperatures each morning before coming to school. Anyone with a fever of 100.4 or higher and/or showing signs of COVID-19 should not come on a school campus. Additionally, students and adults experiencing any symptoms of COVID-19 or who have been exposed to someone with COVID-19 in the past 14 days should not come to school.

All staff will be COVID tested every two months according to the recent guidelines established by SFDPH. St. Anne School along with the other schools in the Cluster will contract to have the testing done.

Reporting/Health Protocols/ Communication

What is the protocol for handling students or staff exhibiting symptoms?

Students or staff who are exhibiting COVID-19 symptoms should not come to school. If they begin exhibiting symptoms after arriving at school, the individual will be separated from others and arrangements will be made for the individual to go home as soon as possible. A “sick room/isolation room” has been set up where symptomatic individuals will remain until they can go home.

St. Anne School will notify the SFDPH and Archdiocese of San Francisco Superintendent when there is a possible case. The school will then be allowing the SFDPH to investigate the case. SFDPH staff will conduct contact tracing using classroom rosters and information obtained from school personnel through interviews and in coordination with school officials in the event of a positive test. As per SFDPH’s guidelines, communication recommendations will vary depending on the specific circumstances of a case in a school community. At a minimum, the affected cohort will need to be notified. Media is handled in coordination between the school administration and the SFDPH.

The CDC and SFDPH guidelines for determining when a person who was recently in close contact with a person with COVID-19 or a person with COVID-19 can return to work or school include:

- Stay home until 14 days after the last exposure -
- Check temperature twice a day and watch for symptoms of COVID-19.
- If possible, stay away from people who are at higher risk of getting very sick from COVID-19.

If a student or staff has a household member that tests positive for COVID-19, the student must quarantine at home for 14 days. As per SFDPH guidelines, SFDPH may issue an order with explicit instructions on quarantine and details on its expiration. If needed, SFDPH may provide clearance letters at the end of isolation/quarantine. Staff or students should contact their personal medical provider if a return-to-school/work clearance note is needed since individual health situations may vary.

“As pediatricians, our top priority is the health and safety of our children. We urge those in public health and education to work together to strike the right balance between preventing the spread of COVID-19 and providing children with the education, nutrition, physical activity, and mental health benefits provided through the reopening of schools.

The risk of COVID-19 transmission among groups of children has not been well-studied, but current research suggests that the risk is much lower than the adult population. The negative effects of missing in-person educational time as children experience prolonged periods of isolation and lack of instruction, however, is clear. Children rely on schools for multiple needs, including but not limited to education, nutrition, physical activity, socialization, and mental health. Special populations of students receive services for disabilities and other conditions that are virtually impossible to deliver online.

Prolonging a meaningful return to in-person education would result in children being at risk for worsening academic, developmental, and health outcomes.”

General Safety Concerns

Will campuses be required to close again?

Saint Anne School has developed a plan in case of the possibility of repeated closures of groups/cohorts of students, particular classes, or the entire facility. Classes will be live-streamed daily so children who are staying at home will not miss valuable classroom instruction. Teachers will be prepared with classwork in the case of an unexpected school closure. It continues to be a possibility that St. Anne School might go into a Distance Learning mode. Students and parents will be trained in the Fall so that learning will not be interrupted if education must take place online.

Preventive measures like keeping sick children home, physical distancing, and cloth face covers will decrease the number of contacts and the spread of the virus. This also means that just because there is a positive case in a classroom, the entire classroom or school may not necessarily need to be sent home.

If a positive case of COVID19 will occurs we will immediately consult with the SFDPH when determining whether a school/class closure is warranted, and for how long.

Online Distance Learning Guidelines

When attending a Distance Learning class from home, students are expected to adhere to the following guidelines:

- Wear either a St. Anne white uniform shirt/blouse or St. Anne polo shirt with the school logo for daily instruction.
- Ensure your workspace is quiet, clean, and has an appropriate background.
- Be on time to the start of the day and the start of all classes.
- Keep video on at all times and stay muted, unless otherwise instructed.
- Be seated at a desk or table and look directly into the camera.
- Avoid eating, getting up, or moving around during class time.

Attendance

- **Regular attendance** is required of all students in order to ensure student success. Students must participate in both at-school and Distance Learning sessions (if and when they occur.) Attendance will be recorded at the start of each day both in-school and for Distance Learning. In the event of a long-term school closure with DL going on, attendance will continue to be taken each day.
- **Tardiness:** Students arriving to school after their class has entered the building, will be required to enter through the front doors of the school on 14th Avenue and go through the same screening procedure that takes place for every child...i.e. temperature check, signed parent health form, wearing a mask, and application of hand sanitizer. Again, social distancing for all parties will be followed during this time.

Arrival and Dismissal

In order to eliminate congested areas on the street, around the neighborhood, and in the school yard while facilitating safe physical distancing during the drop-off and pick-up time, parents and students need to follow these procedures:

PLEASE REMEMBER: All parents must enter and drive through the schoolyard at a SLOW and SAFE speed at all times in the morning and afternoon!!

Morning Arrival

The Morning Drop-Off pattern will be similar to our rainy day routine, entering the yard from the Irving Street gate and exiting out the Funston Avenue gate.

- Parents of students in grades 8-1, 8-2, and 7 drive into the yard at 7:50. Students will exit the car on the school building side and proceed to their specific entry door where they will be screened before being allowed to enter the building. Social distance policies will be followed throughout the screening process and building entrance.

8-1 – Jr. High doors, 8-2 center doors, 7 – 3rd grade doors.

- Parents of students in grades 6, 5, and 4 drive into the yard at 8:05. Students will exit the car on the school building side and proceed to their specific entry door where they will be screened before being allowed to enter the building. Social distance policies will be followed throughout the screening process and building entrance.

Grade 5 - Jr. High door,. Grade 6 - center doors, Grade 4 - 3rd grade doors.

- Parents of students in grades 3, 2, and 1 drive into the yard at 8:20. Students will exit the car on the school building side and proceed to their specific entry door where they will be screened before being allowed to enter the building. Social distance policies will be followed throughout screening process and building entrance.

Grade 3 - 3rd grade doors, Grade 2 - center doors, Grade 1 - Jr. High doors.

- Kindergarten parents can drive into the yard at 8:00 and park their car against the Funston Avenue fence and proceed to walk their child to the Kindergarten entrance doors on 14th Ave.
- Families with multiple children should arrive at the time when the earliest grade child is designated to arrive. Siblings are to sit on the benches along the school building keeping socially distanced as much as possible and wait until their class is called to line up for screening and entrance to the building.

Afternoon Dismissal

Parents picking up their child should follow this procedure: Please do not get out of the car to come over to the building to get your child; they will walk to you. Once the child(ren) is/are in the car, parents should **SLOWLY** and **SAFELY** proceed out the Funston Avenue gate.

- Grades K, 1, and 2 will be dismissed at 2:40. Kindergarten parent cars will park in Section 1, designated in the yard. First grade parent cars will park in Section 2, designated in the yard. Second grade parent cars will park in the Section 3 designated in the yard. The children will be walked out through their respective doors by the teacher and assistant teacher and then the child will walk over to the awaiting parent in their car.
- Grades 3, 4, and 5 will be dismissed at 2:55. Third grade parent cars will park in Section 1, designated in the yard. Fourth grade parent cars will park in Section 2, designated in the yard. Fifth grade parent cars will park in Section 3, designated in the yard. The children will be walked out through their respective doors by the teacher and assistant teacher and then the child will walk over to the awaiting parent in their car.
- Grades 6, 7, and 8 will be dismissed at 3:10. Sixth grade parent cars will park in Section 1, designated in the yard. Seventh grade parent cars will park in Section 2, designated in the yard. Eighth grade parent cars will park in Section 3, designated in the yard. The children will be walked out through their respective doors by the teacher and assistant teacher and then the child will walk over to the awaiting parent in their car.

Families with multiple children should arrive at the dismissal time of their youngest child and park in that child's grade level designated section. They should remain parked there until all their children get into the car. They should then drive slowly and safely out the Funston Street gate.

Extended Care

Extended Care will only be accepting students that have enrolled in the program at the beginning of this semester and have a fixed schedule of attendance. Applications must be submitted before the start of school so children can be assigned to fixed cohorts. Students will not be allowed to “drop-in” to Extended Care while the current SFDPH guidelines are in place.

Moriarty Hall is the designated area for Extended Care to take place each morning and afternoon. Students will be divided up into grade-level cohorts as best as possible. Once cohorts have been set up, students will remain in their cohort while the current SFDPH guidelines remain in place.

Drop off and pick up procedures have been established. Parents will drop students off or pick them up at the Funston Avenue walkway/alleyway in back of St. Anne Church. Parents can walk their child to the entrance, but are not allowed into Moriarty Hall. When picking up students, parents can walk down the walkway to pick up their child. Parents must wear a mask any time they are walking down the walkway to drop off or pick up their child.

When students arrive at the Extended Care entrance, in the morning, they will be wearing their mask, have their temperature taken, present the Extended Care staff with the health form signed by the parent, and then apply hands sanitizer before entering the hall. After-school Extended Care students will not need to present the health form to the teacher. They will be wearing their mask, have their temperature taken, and apply hand sanitizer before entering the hall. In the yard, masks will continue to be worn most times, but always when students are closer than six feet apart.

Students will be socially distanced while working at tables in Moriarty Hall. Cohorts will be socially distanced 10 feet from each other. Students can continue to play in their own cohorts outside in the yard. Equipment will be assigned and marked for each cohort in an attempt to limit cross contamination. Each student will bring their own supplies from home and keep them stored in their backpacks. Any additional supplies that might be

provided will be sanitized by the Extended Care staff at the end of use before it is returned to its location.

Bathroom use will be limited to 5 students in the boys' bathroom and 6 students in the girls' bathroom. Students will put up their "pass" on the hook outside the bathroom in order to limit the number of students using the bathroom. They will be reminded to properly wash their hands before leaving the bathroom. Upon leaving the bathroom, they will remove their "pass" from the hook and return it to their backpack.

Morning "breakfast" and after school snacks will not be provided in Extended Care due to the health and safety concerns as per SFDPH guidelines. Students will need to bring their own morning "breakfast" item(s) and/or afternoon snacks and drink each day to Extended Care.

Unfortunately, Homework Club cannot take place due to the potential of mixing cohorts and limited staffing.

Parent Communication

Back-to-School Night

Due to health and safety protocols, Back to School Night will not be held as normally scheduled. Teachers will conduct (an) evening Zoom meeting(s) with parents. More details will be shared when the school year begins.

Parent Teacher Conferences

Required Parent Student Teacher Conferences will take place November 3 - 6 virtually via Zoom. Students at every grade level are expected to participate in the conference with their teacher and parent(s).

Parents who wish to meet with the teacher during the year are encouraged to call, send a note, or email the classroom teacher to arrange an online meeting.

Drop-in conferences on campus are not permitted at any time due to health and safety protocols in place.

Our St. Anne School Newsletter will continue to be sent home to all families on Wednesday afternoon via email. This newsletter is our primary means of communication and contains all the important information for the week.









- Trouble breathing
- Persistent pain or pressure in the chest
- New confusion
- Inability to wake or stay awake
- Bluish lips or face
